## Coxswain's Corner

As usual, the Winter months are the main time for badge work and learning some of the essentials of seamanship. With a large, predominantly young, Troop, we have a lot doing their Scout award, Junior Seaman and Seaman badges, so I can report that

excellent progress has been made with a good number due to be awarded. The practical components of the various Seaman's badges will be completed as soon as we can get out on the water again. At least we should have a good showing for this year's Marshall Trophy. (This is awarded, on St George's Day, to the Troop who participated in the most camps and activities and gained the highest number of proficiency badges in the past year.)

*Please note:* Parents – do encourage your son or daughter in gaining badges, all they need to do is tell a Leader what badge they wish to obtain and we will provide all the assistance necessary

By popular request, we have modified the programme structure, so that the fourth week of the cycle (seamanship, games, badge work, special activity) now becomes organised activity, with two Patrols responsible for the activities that evening. These have included pizza and pancake making sessions, a formidable quiz, memory games and a few more strenuous inter-Patrol games.

Last November we were the only Scout Troop represented at Remembrance Sunday, and once again Leander was invited by the Mayor to distribute service sheets and assist in the Parish Church.

Another ice skating session was held at the Spectrum Centre, Guildford, always a popular activity. A party of Scouts and Ventures paid a visit to the Boat Show at Earl's Court just after Christmas – it is now absolutely vast, with every kind of boat on show, from inflatable canoes to ocean-going yachts. With tickets kindly supplied by one of the exhibitors, plus reduced train fares, it was a very economical outing.

One of our regular swimming sessions was timed to coincide with the redecorating of the Main Deck walls, so we were out of the painters' way and it now means we have a large number with their advanced swimmer's badge.

Winter Camp, organised by Michael and Jonathan as part of their Chief Scout Award, was held recently at Walton Firs, with a very good turn out of Scouts and Ventures, sixteen in all, who enjoyed same very mild weather and a range of activities (see report).

District Activities are somewhat constrained at the moment. The Night Hike, organised by another group, did not take place, so will hopefully be rescheduled for the Autumn.

The Troop has changed quite dramatically in the last few months. As mentioned before, we have a lot of young and very enthusiastic members, so we are slightly lacking in more experienced Scouts. Michael and Jonathan have become Senior Patrol Leaders, without Patrols but with plenty of experience. This means, for the first tune in Leander's history, we now have three girls as Patrol Leaders – Emily, Ruth and Laura – who fully deserve their appointments.

## The Troop Charter

At Leander, we have a flourishing and very active Scout Troop. Good behaviour from each individual is essential to the smooth running of meetings and the enjoyment of activities by everyone.

Most important of all, there is a serious and essential safety aspect. If we feel that certain Scouts do not listen to or pay attention to instructions from Leaders and Patrol Leaders, they will not be able to participate in boating activities.

A few months ago, we had a little trouble with some aspects of behaviour and discipline, from one particular age group. We have now discussed the issues and a real effort has been made to improve matters. As a consequence, the Patrol Leaders' Council and the Leaders have decided to draw up a Troop Charter. This will be a simple statement that requires every member of the Troop to respect certain basic requirements of discipline and behaviour. By putting these requirements in writing, every Scout will agree to abide by them and will be responsible for his or her own behaviour.

Once the Charter has been agreed and authorised by the Group, each Scout will receive a copy.

## Help needed with Troop

We are desperately short of help in three key areas

#### 1. Boat maintenance

Our boats get heavy use during the year, so it is essential that they are properly maintained during the Winter. Although we have been doing some essential work at Saturday meetings, such as fibre-glassing, sanding dawn, painting and varnishing, there are some jobs that cannot really be done then. If you can handle a saw, a drill or a plane, please get in touch and we can put your skills to use. The gigs and coypus are all maintained using traditional materials – mahogany, ash, brass screws and copper nails. Why not try copper nailing, a real boatbuilder's skill that is in regular demand? We need help to complete the following tasks for the boating season:

**Coypus**: Cut out, sand and varnish bottom boards, stretchers, stretcher chocks, centre board. Replace knees. Secure centre board housing. Renail crutch housings. Resecure thwarts. Renew copper nails. Renew fender screws.

**Home County Gigs**: Coat of varnish on all woodwork. Fit replacement sailing thwart. Renail crutch housings. Renew copper nails. Sand and paint fibreglass. Revarnish woodwork. Secure fender.

#### 2. Supervision during boating activities

We are extremely fortunate to be situated so close to the river, the only problem until now has been watching the traffic on Lower Ham Road when handling boats in and out of the water. Since the cycle track down to Teddington Lock was finished, there has been a notable increase in cyclists. When there is fine weather, the number of cars has also increased.

With the large numbers we now have, we feel it is essential to have two traffic marshals on duty when boating, so that Leaders can concentrate on getting the boats out without having to constantly look out for cyclists and motorists. A rota system would mean that every parent would probably be required for two traffic duties in Summer and Autumn. You would also get the chance to see your son or daughter learning and applying the skills that Leander offers.

Parents, please fill in the rota form which will be distributed after Easter. This will be coordinated by Pat Pritchard to accommodate everyone.

#### 3. Towing

It would be of great benefit if we knew how many parents have tow bars fitted to their cars. This would alleviate the last minute panic that often happens when we need to take the trailer to camp, or move heavy items around. Please fill in the box on the rota form.

# Billy Manning (1931-1998)

Those who have had a long association with Leander will have been very sad to hear of the sudden death in January of William (Billy) Manning. He was a Cub at 3rd Kingston, but joined the Troop at Leander in 1943. He was an extremely loyal and determined individual and, as such, soon became a natural leader, passing from Patrol Leader to the Rover Crew via the Senior Patrol and thence into National Service with the Navy.

He represented the UK in the first post-war Jamboree in France and was one of a hundred Sea Scouts chosen to assist in the chores and organisation of the 1948 Sailing Olympic Games at Torquay.

He spent many a happy hour with Leander 'messing around in boats', and was instrumental in involving Leander in the Great River Race, being one of the original gig's crew members.
