The Canbury and Riverside Association (CARA) met up in September for a litter pick.

CARA has a keen interest in promoting green issues in and around North Kingston and often works to tidy up the parts of the riverside which do not benefit from regular maintenance.

More than 30 people of all ages, including a councillor, the safer neighbourhood team, Leander Sea Scouts, the Albany Sailing Club canoeists and Quadron – the council's parks management group-turned out to tidy between Canbury Gardens and Teddington Lock.

In three hours, 25 bags of rubbish were collected including a tyre, roadwork signs, a cushion, a sign, a cat-flap, plywood, a 'For Sale' sign, a broom, a bucket and a chair.

On top of this, more than 50 carrier bags, four bags of cans, five of plastic bottles and two of glass bottles were also recovered.
